

## **Summary of Shared Rights and Apartment Agreement**

The Office of Residence Life and Housing believes that success at the University of Redlands is rooted in a successful residential experience. In order to facilitate this experience, Residence Life and Housing places a high value on the roommate and suitemate relationship as both a conduit for success and an opportunity to share and learn from other students. Shared understanding and communication are the pillars of the living experience and we have outlined a Summary of Shared Rights and living agreement as a tangible representation. You should take this opportunity to articulate verbally your ideas and comfort levels for the following areas, and then agree upon a written set of shared tangible and intangible standards for your rooms. Only 1 agreement needs to be submitted for the apartment.

Remember: Your Resident Assistant (RA) and Residence Life Staff are available to help at any time before, during, and after this process should you need any assistance. Please do not hesitate to reach out!

## **Summary of Shared Rights**

The Summary of Shared Rights is a statement that details what every student who lives on campus should expect from their roommates, their suitemates, their community, and themselves. These ideals should be discussed thoroughly together.

The right to study: All students should be able to study in their room in a manner that is conducive to their learning style.

The right to sleep: All students should be able to sleep and rest in their room when they choose.

The right to a clean environment: All students should expect a level of cleanliness that is conducive to their daily life.

The right to express oneself: All students should be able to express themselves openly and without fear of judgment or reprisal.

The right to privacy: All students should be able to have a reasonable expectation that their property and ideas can be kept private from their suitemate and/or roommate.

The right to safety: All students should feel safe at all times in their room, apartment and/or bathroom.

The right to address concerns in a civil manner: All students should be able to consult with their roommate or suitemate about any issue that is troubling them or interfering with any of the above rights.
